GUIDANCE ON EXHIBITING

Vegetables, fruit, flowers and domestic: when the schedule specifies more than one in a class, make sure that you have the right number. Entries may otherwise be disqualified.

Vegetables and fruit: in any competitive entry uniformity is important, and it is unwise to weaken an exhibit by mixing large specimens with others which are smaller yet large enough to be of equal merit.

Potatoes: should be free of blemishes caused by pests or disease. Avoid very large tubers which often lack good shape or have deep eyes.

Carrots: choose straight, unforked roots with a good colour. Avoid those which have turned green near the top. Remove leaves to no more than 3ins of stalk.

Parsnips: choose roots with good skin quality, free from rot or other blemishes. Roots should be straight and well-developed at the top. Remove leaves to no more than 3ins of stalk.

Beetroot: should have good skin colour. When cut, the flesh should be a good red colour free from white markings. Remove leaves to no more than 3ins of stalk.

Runner beans: choose long, straight, fresh beans. Avoid pale coloured, coarse specimens which are forming a seed. Retain a section of the stem to enhance appearance.

Onions: uniform, firm, well-ripened bulbs of good colour are required. Tops should be removed. Bulbs should not be skinned excessively and should have firm, thin necks which may be tied.

Tomatoes: should be medium-sized, round, ripe but firm, richly coloured fruits with calyces attached. Avoid fruits which are unripe, overripe, of a dull colour or have green blemishes.

Domestic: all entries will be tasted, and judged on taste as much as presentation.

Maximum exhibit size (classes 1 and 63-68): entries exceeding the specified size will be disqualified.

RULES

1. Exhibits to be brought to The Armoury Hall between 8.30 and 10.45 a.m. Judging will take place at 11 a.m.
2. Entry forms and fees should be returned to Mr Kevin O'Hara by no later than 5 p.m. on Wednesday September 2010.
3. All exhibits must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
4. Only one entry per person per class (owing to space).
5. Exhibits remain the property of the exhibitor but the Committee will be grateful to those who kindly donate exhibits for auction. Exhibits that are not to be included in the auction must be clearly marked with red stickers, which will be provided by the Committee on the morning of the Show. Any exhibits not so marked will be deemed to be available for auction.
6. All horticultural exhibits, with the exception of floral art, must have been grown by the exhibitor.
7. All cups and trophies are perpetual and must be returned one week before the next Annual Show.
8. The awards in classes in which there are three or fewer entries will be at the discretion of the judges.
